



Meth Prevention Lesson What Do You Know Worksheet – Teacher’s Key

Description of tool: The “What Do You Know?” worksheet consists of a list of statements that are related to the topic the students will be exploring. The worksheet contains statements that provoke disagreement and challenge students’ beliefs about the topic. An effort is made to use statements that will result in differences of opinion and thus lead to discussion and debate. Before learning about the material, the students complete the “Before the Lesson” column of the worksheet and can use the Reflection section to take notes while the teacher introduces new concepts that relate to the statements. After the lesson is presented, the students will complete the “After the Lesson” column of the worksheet and return it to the teacher/presenter at the end of the class. This guide will be the basis for conversation throughout the entire lesson. “What Do You Know?” worksheets serve two primary purposes:

- Elicit students’ prior knowledge of the topic.
- Set a purpose for learning (Students learn to gather evidence that will either confirm their initial beliefs or cause them to rethink those beliefs.)
